This problem is largely seen as a law and order problem, and the government has thrust on more security forces into these areas. Although security forces have tackled this menace to a certain extent, there are still some areas where Naxalite strongholds are still present. This is manifested in frequent ambushes of security forces in Naxal areas.

- 4. India is the world's largest democracy. In a democracy, elections provide an opportunity to ascertain the popular will regarding the governance of the country. Election is the act of choosing an individual, usually for holding public office through the free will of the people in a representative democracy. India opted for the universal adult franchise. There were many questions raised about the efficacy of this and how illiterate people will be able to use the vote, which is a rational exercise. There was fear that corrupt practices, along with misuse of money and muscle power would crave, which would be used to manipulate and sway the popular will in the election. Over the years, this fear has been proven right by an increased number of criminals in politics, the issue of capturing huge amounts of illegal money during the election and the rising cost of elections in India. The growing greed for power has turned a sacrosanct activity into a showcase for power and a festival of corruption.

In one such case of ongoing election in the state assembly, it was found that an EVM used for election is found in the car of one political party's member after the election is over in constituency XYZ. This has raised issues on the rigging of elections and questions on the impartiality of the Election Commission of India. Other parties in the state have taken this issue to social media and demanded reelection in the entire state which is a costly exercise. There are elections scheduled for other states' assemblies next month.

The company hired a reputed marketing executive, who increased the volume of sales within a short period. However, some unconfirmed reports came up regarding his indulgence in sexual harassment at the workplace.
 - After some time, a woman employee launched a formal complaint to the management against the marketing executive for sexually harassing her. Faced with the company's indifference in not taking cognisance of her grievances, she lodged an FIR with the police.
 - Realising the sensitivity and gravity of the situation, the company called the woman employee to negotiate. In that, she was offered a hefty sum of money to withdraw the complaint and the FIR and also to give in writing that the marketing executive was not involved in the case.
 - Identify the ethical issues involved in this case. What options are available to the woman employee?
- 10. In a modern democratic polity, there is a concept of the political executive and permanent executive. Elected people's representatives form the political executive, and bureaucracy forms the permanent executive. Ministers frame policy decisions, and bureaucrats execute these. In the initial decades after independence, the relationship between the permanent executive and the political executive was characterised by mutual understanding, respect and cooperation, without encroaching upon each other's domain.
 - However, in the subsequent decades, the situation has changed. There are instances of the political executive insisting upon the permanent executive to follow its agenda. Respect for and appreciation of upright bureaucrats has declined. There is an increasing tendency among the political executive to get involved in routine administrative matters such as transfers, posting etc. Under this scenario, there is a definitive trend towards the 'politicisation of bureaucracy'. The rising materialism and acquisitiveness in social life have also adversely impacted the ethical values of both the permanent executive and the political executive.

What are the consequences of this 'politicisation of bureaucracy'? Discuss.

- 11. In one of the districts of a frontier state, the narcotics menace has been rampant. This has resulted in money laundering, mushrooming of poppy farming, arms smuggling and near stalling of education. The system is on the verge of collapse. The situation has been further worsened by unconfirmed reports that local politicians, as well as some senior police officers, are providing surreptitious patronage to the drug mafia. Then a woman police officer, known for her skills in handling such situations, is appointed as superintendent of police to bring the situation to normalcy.
 - If you are the same police officer, identify the various dimensions of the crisis. Based on your understanding, suggest measures to deal with the crisis.
- 12. In recent times, there has been an increasing concern in India to develop effective civil service ethics, code of conduct, transparency measures, ethics and integrity systems and anti-corruption agencies. Given this, there is a need being felt to focus on three specific areas which are directly relevant to the problems of internalising integrity and ethics in the civil services. These are as follows:
- Anticipating specific threats to ethical standards and integrity in the civil services,
- Strengthening the ethical competence of civil servants and
- Developing administrative processes and practices which promote ethical values and integrity in civil services.

Suggest institutional measures to address the above three issues.

13. Rakesh is a responsible district-level officer who enjoys the trust of his higher officials. Knowing his honesty, the government entrusted him with the responsibility of identifying the beneficiaries under a healthcare scheme meant for senior citizens.

The criteria to be a beneficiary are the following:

- (a) 60 years of age or above.
- (b) Belonging to a reserved community.
- (c) Family income of less than 1 Lakh rupees per annum.
- (d) Post-treatment prognosis is likely to be high to make a positive difference to the quality of life of the beneficiary.

One day, an old couple visited Rakesh's office with their application. They have been the residents of a village in his district since their birth. The old man is diagnosed with a rare condition that obstructs the large intestine. As a consequence, he has severe abdominal pain frequently that prevents him from doing any physical labour. The couple has no children to support them. The expert surgeon whom they contacted is willing to do the surgery without charging any fee. However, the couple will have to bear the cost of incidental charges, such as medicines, hospitalisation, etc., to the tune of one lakh rupees. The couple fulfils all the criteria except criterion 'b'. However, any financial aid would certainly make a significant difference in their quality of life.

How should Rakesh respond to the situation?

- 14. As a senior officer in the Ministry, you have access to important policy decisions and upcoming big announcements such as road construction projects, before they are notified in the public domain. The Ministry is about to announce a mega road project for which the drawings are already in place. Sufficient care was taken by the planners to make use of the government land with the minimum land acquisition from private parties. The compensation rate for private parties was also finalised as per government rules. Care was also taken to minimise deforestation. Once the project is announced, it is expected that there will be a huge spurt in real estate prices in and around that area.
 - Meanwhile, the Minister concerned insists that you realign the road in such a way that it comes closer to his 20 acres of farmhouse. He also suggests that he would facilitate the purchase of a big plot of land in your wife's name at the prevailing rate, which is very nominal, in and around the proposed mega-road project. He also tries to convince you by saying that there is no harm in it as he is buying the land legally. He even promises to supplement your savings in case you do not have sufficient funds to buy the land. However, by the act of realignment, a lot of agricultural land has to be acquired, thereby causing a considerable financial burden on the government and also the displacement of the farmers. As if this is not enough, it will involve cutting down a large number of trees, denuding the area of its green cover.
 - Faced with this situation, what will you do? Critically examine various conflicts of interest and explain what your responsibilities are as a public servant.
- 15. It is a State where liquor prohibition is in force. You are recently appointed as the Superintendent of Police of a district notorious for the illicit distillation of liquor. Illicit liquor leads to many deaths, reported and unreported, and causes a major problem for the district authorities.
 - The approach till now had been to view it as a law and order problem and tackle it accordingly. Raids, arrests, police cases, and criminal trials all these had only limited impact. The problem remains as serious as ever.
 - Your inspections show that the parts of the district where the distillation flourishes are economically, industrially and educationally backward. Agriculture is badly affected by poor irrigation facilities. Frequent clashes among communities gave a boost to illicit distillation. No major initiatives had taken place in the past either from the government's side or from social organisations to improve the lot of the people.
 - Which new approach will you adopt to bring the problem under control?
- 16. A big corporate house is engaged in manufacturing industrial chemicals on a large scale. It proposes to set upon the additional unit. Many states rejected its proposal due to its detrimental effect on the environment. But one state government

acceded to the request and permitted the unit close to a city, brushing aside all opposition.

The unit was set up 10 years ago and was in full swing till recently. The pollution caused by the industrial effluents was affecting the land, water and crops in the area. It was also causing serious health problems for human beings and animals. This gave rise to a series of agitation thousands of people took part, creating a law and order problem necessitating stern police action. Following the public outcry, the State government ordered the closure of the factory.

The closure of the factory resulted in the unemployment of not only those workers who were engaged in the factory but also those who were working in the ancillary units. It also very badly affected that industry which depended on the chemicals manufactured by it.

As a senior officer entrusted with the responsibility of handling this issue, how are you going to address it?

17. Dr X is a leading medical practitioner in the city. He has set up a charitable trust through which he plans to establish a super-speciality hospital in the city to cater to the medical needs of all sections of society. Incidentally, that part of the State had been neglected over the years. The proposed hospital would be a boon for the region.

You are heading the tax investigation agency of that region. During an inspection of the doctor's clinic, your officers found some major irregularities. A few of them are substantial which had resulted in considerable withholding of tax that should be paid by him now. The doctor is cooperative. He undertakes to pay the tax immediately.

However, there are certain other deficiencies in his tax compliance which are purely technical in nature. If these technical defaults are pursued by the agency, considerable time and energy of the doctor will be diverted to issues which are not so serious, urgent or even helpful to the tax collection process. Further, in all probability, it will hamper the prospects of the hospital coming up.

There are two options before you:

- Taking a broader view, ensure substantial tax compliance and ignore defaults that are merely technical in nature.
- Pursue the matter strictly and proceed on all fronts, whether substantial or merely technical.
 - As the head of the tax agency, which course of action will you opt for and why?
- 18. Edward Snowden, a computer expert and former CIA administrator, released confidential Government documents to the press about the existence of Government surveillance programmes. According to many legal experts and the US Government, his action violated the Espionage Act of 1971, which identified the leak of State secrets as an act of treason. Yet, even though he broke the law,

Snowden argued that he had a moral obligation to act. He gave a justification for his "whistle blowing" by stating that he had a duty "to inform the public as to that which is done in their name and that which is done against them."

According to Snowden, the Government's violation of privacy had to be exposed regardless of legality since more substantive issues of social action and public morality were involved here. Many agreed with Snowden. Few argued that he broke the law and compromised national security, for which he should be held accountable.

Do you agree that Snowden's actions were ethically justified even if legally prohibited? Why or why not? Make an argument by weighing the competing values in this case

19. As the whole world is fighting covid-19 pandemic, India has produced 2 vaccines, Covashield and Covaxin, which are made after tremendous research. These 2 vaccines have been approved by the top health body of India after analysing their efficacy and any adverse effect. The government of India has strategised its vaccine programme and has started immunising its citizens. To handle the cases of adverse reactions of vaccines to people, proper standard operating procedures have been formed and are being implemented by vaccine centres. Union Ministry of Health has launched a Mega awareness campaign for covid-19 vaccination drive and urged people to make it into a mass campaign so that more and more people can get the vaccine in the coming months.

However, it is found that the turnout of people for vaccination is low and it has resulted in vaccine wastage and hampering the process of halting covid-19 spread in India. On enquiry about why people are not turning out for vaccination, it is found that people are being misled about the efficacy and side effects of vaccines, like it will make you impotent or result in death.

Some politicians also raised questions about vaccine efficacy and side effect and also claimed that they would not take the vaccine. Although some incidents of mild reactions to people happened after taking the vaccine they were handled properly by the team of the health department at the vaccine centre. Suppose you are a chief medical officer in charge of vaccination in one such district where the turnout of people for vaccination is low and rumours about its efficacy and the side effect is on the rise.

- Find out the ethical issues involved in this case and what strategy you will adopt to handle this.
- 20. Contagious disease spread in the world in the month of November 2019. To control the spread of disease government announced a public lockdown and measures of physical distance and hygiene norms. Due to the lockdown, Companies went into shutdown, and only a few can manage to go online and ask

their employees to work from home. Many people lost their livelihoods and but the major impact is on informal sector workers.

Because women in India are mainly employed in the informal sector, they felt a more disproportionate impact of the lockdown. Along with this economic hardship they faced issues of emotional, mental and physical violence during lockdown. Due to the lockdown and the norm of physical distancing, women could no longer visit their parent's home or their neighbours. Due to all these factors, cases of domestic violence, suicide and killing of women have increased. The burden on police has also increased during lockdown, so they too are busy in lockdown.

- (a) Identify ethical issues involved in the above case.
- (b) Suppose you are posted as a district collector in one such district of India where this is happening; what will be your response to the above situation?
- 21. There is a general rise in alcohol consumption in the country. Alcohol consumption creates not only health issues for the person consuming but also threatens the overall family relations, thus creating problems for other family members. For poor persons, this can create a situation of life or death for the whole family. Considering this, some states have banned the sale and consumption of alcoholic local beverages within their jurisdiction. The banning of local beverages has created an economic crisis for several tribal groups involved in their production. Also, there is a cultural practice of consuming local beverages on certain occasions. Thus, the ban on this has caused tensions in society. Also, there are intelligence inputs of mass protests being sponsored by the 'Daru Mafias' in the state. There are chances of law and order going to be challenged during these protests.
 - Suppose you are the SP of the district which is prone to such protests.
- (a) What are the options available to you?
- (b) What will be your course of action to manage the situation?
- 22. The world has entered the 4th industrial Revolution, which is led by technology like AI, machine learning etc. The government of India is also curious about leveraging this technology for economic development and the welfare of the people. However, as many experts pointed out, the use of AI and various technology will deprive huge employment opportunities in traditional industries. There is a report from NSSO regarding a huge increase in the unemployment rate in the country. There is also a huge skill gap along with diminishing employment opportunities in the government sector. Recently GOI and NITI Aayog have been doing seminars and R& D at a faster pace to incorporate technology-centric governance and infrastructure. People across the state are protesting for employment.



Suppose you are chief secretary of state and a similar type of protest is emerging in your state. There is also an allegation that certain interest group is utilising the opportunity to make the protest violent.

- (a) What are the ethical dilemmas involved in the above case?
- (b) Suggest the steps needed to be taken in the short and long term?
- 23. There is a renewed focus of the government on the industrialisation of economically backward areas of the country. In line with this government has given clearance for setting up a cement plant in the village of Mahua. Lands from farmers of nearby villages are acquired by the government for this. Farmers of the village are protesting against this project for insufficient and delayed compensation as well as they argued that a copy of the environmental clearance granted to the company was not made available in the public domain so they could not file a petition within the time frame. Now farmers' protest has turned violent, in which many people have been injured. The construction company is pushing for an early resolution of the problem, saying that further delay in construction will lead to time and cost over-run. They also argue that the plant will provide a boost to the local economy and infrastructure construction.
- (a) Suppose you are a district collector of the area. What steps will you take to handle the situation?
- (b) What do you think are the reasons for the neglect of public hearings during the process of environmental clearance in India?
- 24. The RTI Act aims to empower Indian citizens to seek information from public authorities and thus, in turn, makes the administration more accountable and responsible. It is viewed as a powerful beacon that lit the unlit corner of the working of the government. However, it has faced resistance because of bureaucratic apathy and inertia. Government functionaries are treating it as an unnecessary burden and the public sees it as another extension of layering of bureaucratic work.
 - This has led to implementation issues and questions have also been raised about the effectiveness of the act in achieving its desired objectives. Apart from this, certain issues related to the people seeking information like their intention or aims of seeking information have also been raised from time to time.
 - In light of these challenges in the implementation of the RTI Act answer the following questions-
- (a) Discuss the importance of the Right to Information for ensuring the Accountability of the government and its functionaries?
- (b) Explain the challenges that the implementation of the RTI Act has faced?
- (c) Suggest the ways to improve the effectiveness of the RTI Act that help in achieving this Act's intended objectives?

- 25. You are the director of the social welfare department. Your department runs several shelter homes for children, reform homes, etc. for the homeless and orphans. It has been brought to your notice that in one of the shelter homes, there has been a possible case of sexual exploitation of a girl child. The person alleged of the crime is related to a senior minister in the government and is known as a major philanthropist in the public. You are also aware that sometimes, children who want to escape shelter homes often make up stories to get out of the shelter home. You are in a fix, as taking any action against the person alleged of the crime will lead to embarrassment for the government and may lead to you being penalised for it. On the other hand, not taking any action on this issue may avoid the political turmoil that comes with this case. You are due to retire in two months.
- (a) Are there any ethical dilemmas involved in this case?
- (b) What would you do in such a situation? Justify your actions.
- 26. You are the Head of the Department at a Central University. Candidates are eager to work under you because of your inclusive and compassionate way of handling things. Raj is a blind candidate and has been pursuing his PhD under your supervision for the last 3 years. You have seen him working consistently, very hard and sincerely. He belongs to an economically deprived background and has already exhausted all his resources in this pursuit. You want Raj to complete his PhD on time and help him find a good job. He has recently submitted his final thesis after 3 years of coursework. You are known to be strict as far as the rules of the University and the quality of research work are concerned. While reviewing the thesis, you notice that a significant part of the final thesis has been plagiarised, well above the permissible limit. This is against the policies and rules of the University. If the external evaluators recognise the duplication in the thesis with any other existing body of work, then it can also affect your reputation.
- (a) Indicate the values in conflict in this case.
- (b) Evaluate the various options available to you and suggest how you would respond to this situation, giving reasons.
- 27. Ravi is a well-known environmental activist of one of the most famous international NGOs. He is 35 Years old and has garnered a lot of support for his activities and suggestions from many other professionals, institutions, and private firms. He is a shower lover and loves to have a shower 3 times a day at least. Obviously, he uses quite a lot of water as compared to those who shower just once a day. For 30 years, he has been continuing with the same routine. Ravi is trying to have an environment-friendly lifestyle but has not given a thought about his shower routine. In the year 2018, because of the success of a large project on saving water Ravi was nominated as "a person who contributed to energy saving of a year" and was given a cash prize of Rs 10 Lakhs and a memento.

You are a friend of Ravi and an environmentalist who has done as good as him. You feel others deserve this nomination, but at the same time, you are in a dilemma. What options do you have with you?

- (a) Out of the options mentioned by you, which step would you like to adhere to and for what reason?
- (b) What moral crisis could be seen in the case?
- 28. A very renowned corporate entity in India was in the news for bad reasons. The corporate house that the entity was running, had managed some letters of undertaking from one of the branches of the banks for overseas credit from other lenders. The entity had aspired for expansion.

Mr X is posted as a zonal manager of the bank, which has issued a Letter of Undertaking. He often remains very busy with the work and signs any file that is cleared by his juniors with a presentation of a few minutes. The letter of undertaking to the corporate entity was given on some relaxed terms and conditions so that the bank could also get benefits from the corporate entities' deal.

Mr Y is junior in position to Mr X and is involved in the deal-making. He has told Mr X only the points which showed a bright picture of the corporate and the bank. The corporate entity failed to return money to the creditors, and the bank got trapped, as it gave the assurance.

- (a) What are the ethical issues involved in the case?
- (b) You are friends with Mr Y and are in full knowledge of the deal, hidden or unhidden. You are an ardent deontologist. What all options are available to you? Which option would you choose and why?
- (c) Suggest some innovative ways to avoid such a problem to occur in the future.
- 29. You are a Secretary in the Ministry of Agriculture. Your Minister has proposed a fixed annual grant to farmers which is expected to cost the public exchequer heavily. Having already taken the decision, he asks you to come up with research to support the scheme. After a lot of effort, you find that the socio-economic benefit of the scheme is reaching only large farmers due to many intricacies in the selection of beneficiaries. You approach the Minister with relevant facts and ask him to plug the gaps in the proposed scheme so that small and marginal farmers can benefit from this decision. However, he asks you to suppress the drawbacks and actively promote the scheme through mass media as the electoral benefits of such a scheme are huge. Elections are due in less than 3 months, and the political party currently in power is expected to return with a majority. Your promotion is also due around the same time. As a secretary, you are expected to fully support and cooperate with the ministers' decisions, and make the scheme a success, despite all the drawbacks in the scheme.

- (a) Mention the different stakeholders in the above situation and also highlight their prospective interests.
- (b) What are the ethical dilemmas faced by you in this situation?
- (c) Evaluate all the options available to you and suggest the best course of action, giving reasons for it.
- 30. You are an honest and responsible civil servant. You often observe the following:
- (a) There is a general perception that by adhering to ethical conduct one may face difficulties oneself and cause problems for the family, whereas unfair practices may help to reach the career goals.
- (b) When the number of people adopting unfair means is large, a small minority having a penchant towards ethical means makes no difference.
- (c) Sticking to ethical means is detrimental to the larger developmental goals
- (d) While one may not involve oneself in large unethical practices, giving and accepting small gifts makes the system more efficient.

Examine the above statements with their merits and demerits.

- 31. You are aspiring to become an IAS officer and you have cleared various stages and now you have been selected for the personal interview. On the day of the interview, on the way to the venue, you saw an accident where a mother and child who happen to be your relatives were badly injured. They needed immediate help. What would you have done in such a situation? Justify your action.
- 32. You are the head of the Human Resources department of an organisation. One day one of the workers died on duty. His family was demanding compensation. However, the company denied compensation because it was revealed in the investigation that he was drunk at the time of the accident. The workers of the company went to strike demanding compensation for the family of the deceased. The Chairman of the management board has asked for your recommendation.

What recommendation would you provide the management?

Discuss the merits and demerits of each of the recommendations.

33. You are the manager of a spare parts company A and you have to negotiate a deal with the manager of a large manufacturing company B. The deal is highly competitive and sealing the deal is critical for your company. The deal is being worked out over dinner. After dinner, the manager of manufacturing company B offered to drop you at the hotel in his car. On the way to the hotel, he happens to hit a motorcycle, injuring the motorcyclist badly. You know the manager was driving fast and thus lost control. The law enforcement officer comes to investigate the issue and you are the sole eyewitness to it. Knowing the strict laws about road accidents you are aware that your honest account of the incident would lead to the prosecution of the manager, and as a consequence the deal is likely to be jeopardised, which is of immense importance to your company.

What are the dilemmas you face? What will be your response to the situation?

34. A building permitted for three floors, while being extended illegally to 6 floors by a builder, collapses. As a consequence, several innocent labourers including women and children died. These labourers are migrants from different places. The government immediately announced cash relief to the aggrieved families and arrested the builder.

Give reasons for such incidents taking place across the country. Suggest measures to prevent their occurrence.

- 35. You are a Public Information Officer (PIO) in a government department. You are aware that the RTI Act 2005 envisages transparency and accountability in administration. The act has functioned as a check on the supposedly arbitrary administrative behaviour and actions. However, as a PIO, you have observed that there are citizens who filed RTI applications not for themselves but on behalf of such stakeholders who purportedly want to have access to information to further their interests. At the same time, there are these RTI activists who routinely file RTI applications and attempt to extort money from the decision-makers. This type of RTI activism has affected the functioning of the administration adversely and also possibly jeopardises the genuineness of the applications, which are essentially aimed at getting justice.
- What measures would you suggest to separate genuine and non-genuine applications? Give merits and demerits of your suggestions.
- 36. Rajesh Kumar is a senior public servant with a reputation of honesty and forthrightness, currently posted in the Finance Ministry as Head of the Budget Division. His department is presently busy organising budgetary support to the states, four of which are due to go to the polls within the financial year.
 - This year's annual budget allotted 78300 crores for the National Housing Scheme (NHS), a centrally sponsored social housing scheme for the weaker sections of society. 775 crores have been drawn for NHS till June.
 - The Ministry of Commerce had long been pursuing a case for setting up a Special Economic Zone (SEZ) in a southern state to boost exports. After two years of detailed discussions between the centre and the state, the Union Cabinet approved the project in August. The process was initiated to acquire the necessary land.

Eighteen months ago, a leading Public Sector Unit (PSU) had projected the need for setting up a large natural gas processing plant in a northern state for the regional gas grid. The required land is already in possession of the PSU. The gas grid is an essential component of the national energy security strategy. After three rounds of global bidding the project was allotted to an MNC, M/s XYZ Hydrocarbons. The first tranche of payments to the MNC is scheduled to be made in December.



Finance Ministry was asked for a timely allocation of an additional 6000 crores for these two developmental projects. It was decided to recommend the reappropriation of this entire amount from the NHS allocation. The file was forwarded to Budget Department for their comments and further processing. On studying the case file, Rajesh Kumar realised that this re-appropriation might cause an inordinate delay in the execution of NHS, a project much publicised in the rallies of senior politicians. Correspondingly, the non-availability of finances would cause a financial loss in the SEZ and national embarrassment due to delayed payment in an international project.

Rajesh Kumar discussed the matter with his seniors. He was conveyed that this politically sensitive situation needed to be processed immediately. Rajesh Kumar realised the diversion of funds from NHS could raise difficult questions for the government in the Parliament.

Discuss the following with reference to this case:

Ethical issues involved in the re-appropriation of funds from a welfare project to a developmental project.

Given the need for proper utilisation of public funds, discuss the options available to Rajesh Kumar. Is resigning a worthy option?

37. The Chairman of Bharat Missiles Ltd (BML) was watching a program on TV wherein the Prime Minister was addressing the nation on the necessity of developing a self-reliant India. He subconsciously nodded in agreement and smiled to himself as he mentally reviewed BML's journey in the past two decades. BML had admirably progressed from producing first-generation anti-tank guided missiles (ATGMs) to designing and producing state-of-the-art ATGM weapon systems that would be the envy of any army. He sighed in reconciliation with his assumptions that the government would probably not alter the status quo of a ban on the export of military weaponry.

To his surprise, the very next day, he got a telephone call from the Director General, Ministry of Defence, asking him to discuss the modalities of increasing BML production of ATGMs as there is a possibility of exporting the same to a friendly foreign country. The Director General wanted the Chairman to discuss the details with his staff in Delhi next week.

Two days later, at a press conference, the Defence Minister stated that he aims to double the current weapons export levels within five years. This would give an impetus to financing the development and manufacture of indigenous weapons in the country. He also stated that all indigenous arms manufacturing nations have a very good record of the international arms trade. As Chairman of BML, what are your views on the following points?

As an arms exporter of a responsible nation like India, what are the ethical issues involved in arms trade?

- List five ethical factors that would influence the decision to sell arms to foreign governments.
- 38. Rampura, a remote district inhabited by a tribal population, is marked by extreme backwardness and abject poverty. Agriculture is the mainstay of the local population, though it is primarily subsistence due to the very small land holdings. There is insignificant industrial or mining activity. Even the targeted welfare programs have inadequately benefited the tribal population. In this restrictive scenario, the youth has begun to migrate to other states to supplement the family income. The plight of minor girls is that their parents are persuaded by labour contractors to send them to work in the Bt Cotton farms of a nearby state. The soft fingers of the minor girls are well suited for plucking the cotton. The inadequate living and working conditions in these farms have caused serious health issues for the minor girls. NGOs in the districts of domicile and the cotton farms appear to be compromised and have not effectively espoused the twin issues of child labour and development of the area.
 - You are appointed as the District Collector of Rampura. Identify the ethical issues involved. Which specific steps will you initiate to ameliorate the conditions of minor girls in your district and to improve the overall economic scenario in the district?
- 40. Parmal is a small but underdeveloped district. It has rocky terrain that is not suitable for agriculture, though some subsistence agriculture is being done on small plots of land. The area receives adequate rainfall and has an irrigation canal flowing through it. Amria, its administrative centre, is a medium-sized town. It houses a large district hospital, an Industrial Training Institute and some privately owned skill training centres. It has all the facilities of a district headquarters. A trunk railway line passes approximately 50 kilometres from Amria. Its poor connectivity is a major reason for the absence of any major industry therein. The state government offers a 10 years tax holiday as an incentive to new industries. In 2010 Anil, an industrialist, decided to take benefits to set up Amria Plastic Works (APW) in Noora village, about 20 km from Amria. While the factory was being built, Anil hired the required key labour and got them trained at the skill training centres at Amria. This act of his made the key personnel very loyal to APW.

APW started production in 2011 with the labour drawn fully from Noora village. The villagers were very happy to get employment near their homes and were motivated by the key personnel to meet the production targets with high quality. APW started making large profits, a sizeable portion of which was used to improve the quality of life in Noora. By 2016, Noora could boast of a greener village and a renovated village temple. Anil liaised with the local MLA to increase the frequency of the bus services to Amria. The government also opened a primary health care centre and primary school at Noora in buildings constructed by APW. APW used

its CSR funds to set up women's self-help groups, subsidise primary education for the village children and procure an ambulance for use by its employees and the needy.

In 2019, there was a minor fire in APW. It was quickly extinguished as fire safety protocols were in place in the factory. Investigations revealed that the factory had been using electricity over its authorised capacity. This was soon rectified. The next year, due to a nationwide lockdown, the requirement for production fell for four months. Anil decided that all employees would be paid regularly. He employed them to plant trees and improve the village habitat. APW has developed a reputation for high-quality production and a motivated workforce. Critically analyse the story of APW and state the ethical issues involved. Do you consider APW a role model for the development of backward areas? Give reasons.

42. Sunil is a young civil servant and has a reputation for his competence, integrity, dedication and relentless pursuit of difficult and onerous jobs. Considering his profile, he was picked up by his bosses to handle a very challenging and sensitive assignment. He was posted in a tribal-dominated district notorious for illegal sand mining. Excavating sand from river belts and transporting it through trucks and selling them in the black market was rampant. This illegal sand mining mafia was operating with the support of local functionaries and tribal musclemen who in turn, were bribing selected poor tribals and had kept the tribals under fear and intimidation.

Sunil being a sharp and energetic officer immediately grasped the ground realities and the modus operandi followed by the mafia through their devious and dubious mechanism. On making inquiries, he gathered that some of their office employees are in hand and gloves with them and have developed close unholy nexus. Sunil initiated stringent action against them and started conducting raids on their illegal operations of the movement of trucks filled with sand. The mafia got rattled as not many officers in the past had taken such steps against the mafia. Some of the office employees who were allegedly close to the mafia informed them that the officer was determined to clean up the mafia's illegal sand mining operations in the district and may cause them irreparable damage.

The mafia turned hostile and launched a counter-offensive. The tribal musclemen and mafia started threatening him with dire consequences. His family (wife and old mother) were stalked and were under virtual surveillance and thus causing mental torture, agony and stress to all of them. The matter assumed serious proportions when a muscleman came to his office and threatened him to stop raids, etc. Otherwise, his fate will not be different from some of his predecessors (ten years back, one officer was killed by the mafia).

- a) Identify the different options available to Sunil in attending to this situation.
- b) Critically evaluate each of the options listed by you.

- c) Which of the above, do you think, would be the most appropriate for Sunil to adopt and why?
- 43. You are the Vice Principal of a degree college in one of the middle-class towns. The Principal has recently retired, and management is looking for his replacement. There are also feelers that the management may promote you as Principal. In the meantime, during the annual examination, the flying squad came from the university and caught two red-handed students involved in unfair means. A senior lecturer of the college was personally helping these students in this act. This senior lecturer also happens to be close to the management. One of the students was the son of a local politician who was responsible for getting the college affiliated with the present reputed university. The second student was the son of a local businessman who had donated maximum funds for running the college. You immediately informed the management regarding this unfortunate incident. The management told you to resolve the issue with the flying squad at any cost. They further said that such incidents would not only tarnish the image of the college but also that politicians and businessmen are very important personalities for the functioning of the college. You were also given a hint that your further promotion to Principal depends on your capability to resolve this issue with the flying squad. In the meantime, you were intimated by your administrative officer that certain members of the student union are protesting outside the college gate against the senior lecturer and the students involved in this incident and demanding strict action against defaulters.
- a) Discuss the ethical issues involved in the case.
- b) Critically examine the options available to you as Vice Principal. What option will you adopt and why?
- 46. A Reputed food product company based in India developed a food product for the international market and started exporting the same after getting the necessary approvals. The company announced this achievement and also indicated that soon the product will be made available for domestic consumers with almost sane quality and health benefits. Accordingly, the company got its product approved by a competent domestic authority and launched the product in the Indian market. The company could increase its market share over a period of time and earn substantial profit both domestically and internationally. However, the random sample test conducted by the inspecting team found the product being sold domestically at variance with the approval obtained from the competent authority. On further investigation, it was also discovered that the food company was not only selling products which were not meeting the health standard of the country but also selling the rejected export products in the domestic market. This episode adversely affected the reputation and profitability of the food company.

- a) What action do you visualise should be taken by the competent authority against the food company for violating the laid down domestic food standard and selling rejected export products in the domestic market?
- b) What course of action is available with the food company to resolve the crisis and bring back its lost reputation?
- c) Examine the ethical dilemma involved in the case.
- 47 Pawan has been working as an officer in the State Government for the last ten years. As a part of a routine transfer, he was posted to another department. He joined a new office along with five other colleagues. The head of the office was a senior officer conversant with the functioning of the office. As a part of the general inquiry, Pawan gathered that his senior officer carries the reputation of being a difficult and insensitive person having his own disturbed family life. Initially, all seemed to go well. However, after some time, Pawan felt that the senior officer was belittling him and, at times, unreasonable. Whatever suggestions given or views expressed by Pawan in the meetings were summarily rejected and the senior officer would express displeasure in the presence of others. It became a pattern of the boss's style of functioning to show him in bad light, highlighting his shortcomings and humiliating him publicly. It became apparent that though there were no serious work-related problems/shortcomings, the senior officer was always on one pretext or the other and would scold and shout at him. The continuous harassment and public criticism of Pawan resulted in the loss of confidence, self-esteem and equanimity. Pawan realised that his relations with his senior officer were becoming more toxic and due to this, he felt perpetually tensed, anxious and stressed. His mind was occupied with negativity, which caused him mental torture, anguish and agony. Eventually, it badly affected his personal and family life. He was no longer joyous, happy and contented event home. Rather without any reason, he would lose his temper with his wife and other family members. The family environment was no longer pleasant and congenial. His wife who was always supportive of him also became a victim of his negativity and hostile behaviour. Due to harassment and humiliation suffered by him in the office, comfort and happiness virtually vanished from his life. Thus, it damaged his physical and mental health.
- a) What are the options available to Pawan to cope with the situation?
- b) What approach should Pawan adopt to bring peace, tranquillity and a congenial environment in the office and home?
- c) As an outsider, what are your Suggestions for both boss and subordinate to overcome this situation and for improving work performance, and mental and emotional hygiene?
- d) In the above scenario, what type of training would you suggest at various levels in the government offices?

48. Prabhat was working as Vice President (Marketing) at Sterling Electric Ltd., a reputed multinational company. But presently the company was passing through difficult times as the sales were continuously showing a downward trend in the last two quarters. His division, which hitherto had been a major revenue contributor to the company's financial health, was now desperately trying to procure some big government order for them. But their best efforts did not yield any positive success or breakthrough.

His was a professional company, and his local bosses were under pressure from their London-based HO to show some positive results. In the last performance review meeting taken by the Executive Director (India Head), he was reprimanded for his poor performance. He assured them that his division is working on a special contract from the Ministry of Defence for a secret installation near Gwalior and the tender is being submitted shortly.

He was under extreme pressure, and he was deeply perturbed. What aggravated the situation further was a warning from the top that if the deal is not clinched in favour of the company, his division might have to be closed and he may have to quit his lucrative job.

There was another dimension which was causing him deep mental torture and agony. This pertained to his precarious financial health. He was a single earner in the family with two school-college-going children and his old ailing mother. The heavy expenditure on education and medical was causing a big strain on his monthly pay packet. Regular EMI for housing loans taken from banks is unavoidable and any default would render him liable for severe legal action.

Against the above backdrop, he was hoping for some miracle to happen. There was a sudden turn of events. His secretary informed him that a gentleman Subhas Verma wanted to see him as he was interested in the position of Manager, which was to be filled by him in the company. He further brought to his notice that his CV has been received through the office of the Minister of Defence.

During the interview of the candidate-Subhash Verma, he found him technically sound, resourceful and experienced marketeer. He seemed to be well-conversant with tendering procedures and had the knack of follow-up and liaising in this regard Prabhat felt that he was a better choice than the rest of the candidates who were recently interviewed by him in the last few days.

Subhash Verma also indicated that he was in possession of the copies of the bid documents that Unique Electronics Ltd. would be submitting the next day to the Defence Ministry for their tender. He offered to hand over those documents subject to his employment in the company on suitable terms and conditions. He made it clear that in the process, Sterling Electric Ltd. could outbid their rival company and get the bid and hefty Defence Ministry order. He indicated that it would be a win-win situation for both him and the company.

Prabhat was stunned. It was a mixed feeling of shock and thrill. He was uncomfortable and perspiring. If accepted, all his problems would vanish instantly, and he may be rewarded for securing the much-awaited tender and thereby boosting the company's sales and financial health. He was in a fix as to the future course of action. He was wonder-struck at the guts of Subhash Verma in having surreptitiously removed his company papers and offered to the rival company for a job. Being an experienced person, he was examining the pros and cons of the proposal/situation, and he asked him to come the next day.

- 49 Ramesh is a State Civil Services Officer who got the opportunity of getting posted to the capital of a border State after rendering 20 years of service. Ramesh's mother has recently been detected with cancer and has been admitted to the leading cancer hospital in the city. His two adolescent children have also got admission to one of the best public schools in the town. After settling down in his appointment as Director in the Home Department of the State, Ramesh got a confidential report through intelligence sources that illegal migrants were infiltrating the State from a neighbouring country. He decided to personally carry out a surprise check of the border posts along with his Home Department team. To his surprise, he caught red-handed two families of 12 members infiltrated with the connivance of the security personnel at the border posts. On further inquiry and investigation, it was found that after the migrants from neighbouring countries infiltrate, their documentation like Aadhaar Card, Ration Card and Voter Card are also forged, and they are made to settle down in a particular area of the State. Ramesh prepared the detailed and comprehensive report and submitted it to the Additional Secretary of the State. However, he has summoned by the Additional Home Secretary after a week and was instructed to withdraw the report. The Additional Home Secretary informed Ramesh that the report submitted by him had not been appreciated by the higher authorities. He further cautioned him that if he fails to withdraw the confidential report, he will not only be posted out from the prestigious appointment from the State capital, but his further promotion, which is due shortly, will also get in jeopardy.
- (a) What are the options available to Ramesh as the Director of the Home Department of the bordering State?
- (b) What option should Ramesh adopt and why?
- (c) Critically evaluate each of the options.
- (d) What are the ethical dilemmas being faced by Ramesh?
- (e) What policy measures would you suggest to combat the menace of infiltration of illegal migrants from the neighbouring country?

- The Supreme Court has banned mining in the Aravalli Hills to stop the degradation of the forest cover and to maintain ecological balance. However, stone mining to still prevalent in the border district of the affected State with the connivance of certain corrupt forest officials and politicians. A young and dynamic SP who was recently posted in the affected district promised to himself to stop this menace. In one of his surprise checks with his team, he found a loaded truck with stone trying to escape the mining area. He tried to stop the truck, but the truck driver overruns the police officer, killing him on the spot and thereafter managed to flee. Police filed FIR, but no breakthrough was achieved in the case for almost three months. Ashok, who was the Investigative Journalist working with a leading TV channel, suo moto, started investigating the case. Within one month, Ashok got a breakthrough by interacting with local people, the stone mining mafia and government officials. He prepared his investigative story and presented it to the CMD of the TV channel. He exposed in his investigative report the complete nexus of the stone mafia working with the blessing of corrupt police and city officials, and politicians. The politician who was involved in the mafia was no one else but a local MLA who was considered to be very close to the Chief Minister. After going through the investigative report, the CMD advised Ashok to drop the idea of making the story public through electronic media. He informed that the local MLA was not only the relative of the owner of the TV channel but also had an unofficially 20 per cent share in the channel. The CMD further informed Ashok that his further promotion and hike in pay would be taken care of in addition, the soft loan of 10 lakhs which he has taken from the TV channel for his son's chronic disease will be suitably adjusted if he hands over the investigative report to him.

- (d) Which of the options, do you think, would be the most appropriate for Ashok to adopt and why?
- (e) In the above scenario, what type of training would you suggest for police officers posted to such districts where illegal stone mining activities are rampant?
- 51. You have done MBA from a reputed institution three years back but could not get campus placement due to COVID-19 generated recession. However, after a lot of persuasions and a series of competitive tests, including written and interviews, you managed to get a job in a leading shoe company. You have eager parents who are dependent and staying with you. You also recently got married after getting this decent job. You were allotted the Inspection Section, which is responsible for clearing the final product. In the first year, you learnt your job well and were appreciated for your performance by the management. The company

has been doing good business for the last five years in the domestic market, and this year it is decided even to export to Europe and Gulf countries. However, one large consignment to Europe was rejected by their Inspecting Team due to certain poor quality and was sent back. The top management ordered that the ibid consignment be cleared for the domestic market. As a part of the Inspecting Team, you observed the glaring poor quality and brought it to the knowledge of the Team Commander. However, the top management advised all the members of the team to overlook these defects as the management could not bear such a huge loss. Rest of the team members except you promptly signed and cleared the consignment for the domestic market, overlooking glaring defects. You again brought to the knowledge of the Team Commander that such consignment, if cleared even for the domestic market, will tarnish the image and reputation of the company and will be counter-productive in the long run. However, you were further advised by the top management that if you do not clear the consignment, the company will not hesitate to terminate your services citing certain innocuous reasons.

- (e) What can be the consequences of overlooking the observations raised by the Inspecting Team?
- 52. Rakesh was working as a Joint Commissioner in the Transport department of a city. As a part of his job profile, among others, he was entrusted with the task of overseeing the control and functioning of the City Transport Department. A case strike by the drivers' union of the City Transport Department over the issue of compensation to a driver who died on duty while driving the bus came up before him for a decision in the matter.

He gathered that the driver (deceased) was plying Bus No. 528 which passed through busy and congested roads of the city. It so happened that near an intersection on the way, there was an accident involving a middle-aged man. It was found that there was an altercation between the driver and the car driver. Heated arguments between them led to a fight and the driver gave him a blow. A lot of passersby had gathered and tried to intervene but without success. Eventually, both of them were badly injured and profusely bleeding and were taken to the nearby hospital. The driver succumbed to the injuries and could not be saved. The middle-aged driver's condition was also critical but after a day, he recovered and was discharged. Police had immediately come to the spot and FIR was registered. Police investigation revealed that the quarrel was started by the



bus driver and he had resorted to physical violence. There is an exchange of blows between them.

The City Transport Department management is considering not giving any extra compensation to the driver's (deceased) family. The family is very aggrieved depressed, and agitated against the discriminatory and non-sympathetic approach of the City Transport Department management. The bus driver (deceased) was 52 years of age and was survived by his wife and two school-college-going daughters. He was the sole earner of the family. The City Transport Department workers' union took up this case and when it found no favourable response from the management, decided to go on strike. The union's demand was twofold. First was full extra compensation as given to other drivers who died on duty and second employment to one family member. The strike has continued for 10 days, and the deadlock remains.

- 53. You are appointed as an officer heading the section in Environment Pollution Control Board to ensure compliance and its follow-up. In that region, there were a large number of small and medium industries which had been granted clearance. You learnt that these industries employ many migrant workers. Most of the industrial units have got environmental clearance certificates in their possession. The environmental clearance seeks to curb industries and projects that supposedly hamper the environment and living species in the region But in practice. Most of these units remain to be polluting units in several ways like air, water and soil pollution. As such, local people encountered persistent health problems.

It was confirmed that the majority of the industries were violating environmental compliance. You issued notice to all the industrial units to apply for a fresh environmental clearance certificate from the competent authority. However, your action met with a hostile response from a section of the industrial units, other vested interest persons and a section of the local politicians. The workers also became hostile to you as they felt that your action would lead to the closure of these industrial units, and the resultant unemployment will lead to insecurity and uncertainty in their livelihood. Many owners of the industries approached you with the plea that you should not initiate harsh action as it would compel them to their units and cause huge financial loss, and shortage of their products in the market. These would add to the sufferings of the labourers and the consumers alike. The labour union also sent you representation requesting the closure of the units. You simultaneously started receiving threats from unknown corners. You,



however, received support from some of your colleagues, who advised you to act freely to ensure environmental compliance. Local NGOs also came to your support, and they demanded the closure of the polluting units immediately.

- 54. You have been appointed as the DM of a district. In one of the areas of your district, there are illegal slums. The area was designated as a space for creating multilevel parking to decrease the congestion in the city. You have been asked to clear the slums for the construction of this parking structure which can significantly decrease traffic congestion. However, the slum dwellers are protesting aggressively against the demolition of slums and are adopting violent means to oppose the demolition.
 - What would be your response in this circumstance? Examine the quality of a civil servant who will be required to manage the situations.
- 55. The cases of encounters have increased over time, and what's more worrying is the trend of it becoming readily acceptable by the public and media. Media has readily given 'Encounter Specialists' cult status. Media has too easily accepted the police version of "encounters" without doing any independent investigation of its own, and it has too readily given 'Encounter Specialists' cult status. The public is left with no choice but to believe what is being fed to them.
 - What are the consequences of the popularisation of Encounters? Discuss the ethical issues involved with police encounters.
- 57. In one of the districts of a relatively backward state, Food adulteration is on the rise. Several people have been admitted to hospitals in the recent past due to food poisoning. The system has been worsened by the alleged collusion of food safety officers with food chain owners. A New designated officer has been assigned to the district to ensure the safety of the general public.
 - If you are the same designated officer, identify the various dimensions of the crisis. Based on your understanding, what measures would you take to deal with the crisis?
- 58. You are an officer entrusted with the task of ensuring that in the post-lockdown period, the concept of physical distancing is being strictly enforced. In your district, vegetable vendors used to gather at designated places on fixed days before the Covid pandemic. However, during the lockdown period, these gatherings were prohibited. Now since all the other shops have been allowed to start operations with adherence to government policies. There is a demand from the vegetable vendors to allow them to organise the weekly markets as their

livelihood is lost. However, in light of the expected crowd, there is an inherent risk of spreading the virus.

On investigation, you found that the officers in charge of procurement were not procuring paddy on the false pretext of excess moisture in paddy. Another reason given by officers was that most of the farmers were not registered with the government mandis, and hence their products couldn't be procured in the mandis. Several farmers have reached the mandi with their products which are lying there in the open.

- 60. Gopal is an IAS officer, suspended for renewing the FCRA licence to a controversial religious preacher's Research Foundation, even though there were pending cases against his organisation. He has implemented important initiatives of the government over the years.
 - In an unusual move, as many as 15 joint secretaries working in the ministry are lobbying and advocating for the immediate revocation of the order of his suspension.

- (c) Express your opinion on the issue as a civil servant.
- 61. Recently, members of political groups barged into a central University's Faculty of Fine Arts. They were looking for artworks they had viewed on social media and found "distasteful and hurtful to religious sentiments". One series reportedly featured cut-outs of gods and goddesses with newspaper reports of crimes against women, while another was a collage with the Ashoka pillar positioned in an "obscene manner".

Resisting the break-in, the faculty and staff of the department argued that the exhibition was still to be opened for the public to view, and the display was being finalised. Speaking to the media, the dean also denied that the frames were part of the evaluation submissions. It was also emphasised that the 2007 resolution

would have been followed, according to which all works would have been checked and approved before the opening of the annual exhibition.

Recently, a few animals died at the site of another film directed by the same person. It has been claimed that the deaths were accidental. However, there are rumours that the deaths were not accidental and could have been avoided. Local politicians in the region have been trying to create pressure for the approval of the film. Moreover, the subject has gained the attention of the public, who is

- 63. You are an employee in a senior position in a well-renowned pharmaceutical company. This company is doing research for creating medicine for the treatment of a genetic disease called Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA), a progressive condition that affects the nerves that signal the muscle, leading to muscular weakness. Children with severe SMA disease mostly die in the first two years of their life. The company has successfully created the drug, and clinical trials are showing promising results. Over 80% of children who have received the drug during clinical trials have been cured. Clinical trials will continue for over 2 years till the company receives the nod from the government for its launch in the

market. Your niece, who is one year old, is suffering from the same disease. Patients for clinical trials have already been selected, so she cannot participate in the clinical trials. She is suffering from severe SMA disease and cannot stand a chance to wait for the official launch of the medicine. Your sister and her husband have been requesting you arrange the medicine for their daughter. You have access to the medicine and can get it easily for them, but it can create difficulties for you and your company.

- 67. Jallikattu is a facet of the Indian culture which dates back to the tradition of ancient India. It is typically a bull-taming sport, practised in thousands of villages in the Indian state of Tamil Nadu as a part of Pongal celebrations.
 - Activists have argued that bulls are deliberately placed in a terrifying situation in a crowd to run away. The desperate bulls are so frightened that they jump off barriers which results in fatal injuries to the bulls and human life risk. They are often provoked with alcohol, sticks, knives, sickles and even chilli powder in the eyes.

Many animal rights activists often protest against such bullfighting, citing the needless life endangerment of the bull and people. However, to some people, it is not merely a culturally significant sport but also a fine art in which the bullfighter is trained in a certain style and elicits emotion through the act of the fight. Some argue that these bulls are taken care of better than other cattle like cows.

You came to know about the violation of many provisions of the bidding process. The violation of the process has happened to allocate the mine to a relative of the minister. Now seniors are pressuring you to withhold the information based on national interest. Being a public information officer, you will be held accountable for the reasons you will give to withhold the information.

- 71.
