- In the absence of ratification by the States in the amendment IXB added Part to the Constitution, the amendment that sought to prescribe the outlines of State laws on a State pass did subject not constitutional muster. However, there is no denying that the scope for democratising the functioning of cooperative societies and enhancing their autonomy remains unchanged.

AMENDMENT IN IBBI REGULATIONS 2016

1.The Insolvency and Bankruptcy Board of India (IBBI) has amended the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Board of India (Insolvency Resolution Process for Corporate Persons) Regulations, 2016. The amendments are aimed at enhancing the discipline, transparency, and accountability in corporate insolvency proceedings.

2.In March 2021 a sub-committee of the Insolvency Law Committee (ILC) recommended a pre-pack framework within the basic structure of the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC), 2016.

3.The amendment requires an Insolvency Professional (IP) conducting Corporate Insolvency Resolution Process (CIRP) to disclose all former names and registered office address(es) so changed in the two years preceding the commencement of insolvency along with the current name and registered office address of the Corporate Debtor (CD), in all its communications and records.

4.Significance: It would allow stakeholders to claw back lost value and would disincentive stakeholders from entering into such transactions.The IBC was enacted in **2016.** Objective: To streamline and speed up the resolution process of failed businesses.

GEOSPATIAL TECHNOLOGIES FOR THE WATER SECTOR IN INDIA

1.The Association of Geospatial Industries released a report titled "Potential of Geospatial Technologies for the Water Sector in India". The report mentions opportunities in the Water sector that can benefit from the use of Geospatial technologies.

2.Geospatial technologies is a term used to describe the range of modern tools contributing to the geographic mapping and analysis of the Earth and human societies.

3.Geospatial and digital technologies like Satellite Based Remote Sensing, GPS Based Equipment and Sensors, Artificial Intelligence, Big Data Analytics, Internet of Things, 5G, Robotics and Digital Twin, can be effectively used to combat the water crisis.

4.Demand-Supply Mismatch: India has about 17% of the world population, but only about 4% of the world's freshwater reserves, and is currently facing a severe water challenge.

POLLUTED RIVER STRETCHES

1.The Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) in 2018 identified 351 polluted river stretches in India. CPCB study reveals that discharge of untreated wastewater is one of the main causes of river pollution.

2.The assessment of water quality for identification of polluted river stretches found that 31 states and Union territories (UT) had rivers and streams that did not meet the water quality criteria.

3.Concentration of Polluted River Stretches: Almost 60% of polluted river stretches exist in eight states: Maharashtra, Assam, Madhya Pradesh, Kerala, Gujarat, Odisha, West Bengal and Karnataka. Maharashtra has the maximum number of polluted river stretches in the country. PLACES IN NEWS
